 - a. Use of home/personal devices during the pandemic There are many different platforms for virtual communication, and some are compatible with our "work" devices and some are not. What rules does your agency information technology department have in place? Do they permit you to use your "personal" device in this situation? If not, what are the ethical implications of using your "personal" device on "work" time? Would this make your device subject to a government search? (This does not include if you log on to your "work" VPN through your "personal" device.)
 - b. Dealing with persistent inquirers raising issues where the ombudsman's office can no longer assist and where the inquirer is also adversely affecting the operations of the ombuds resource
 - **c.** Security of electronic records, methods by which ombuds are protecting their electronic records

5. General Questions

- a. How to approach senior leadership about the tone of emails?
- b. Emails do not have a tone by itself and are usually determined by the reader based on past experiences with the sender
- c. When tone is in question then this is a good opportunity to ask about past experiences between the sender/reader
- d. Typically, when there is missing information in an email the reader fills gaps with emotions
- e. It would be good to have the visitor read the email in different tones.

6. Discussion Topics

a. Use of home/personal devices during the pandemic

- i. Topic of discussion is the use of home devices during the pandemic
- ii. Zoom is the typical example of a platform that is of common use for virtual meetings
- iii. Zoom is not allowed in some agencies/departments in the government
- iv. Has anyone used their personal device to communicate virtually during the pandemic and why?
- v. Yes, some have used their personal devices due to COVID-19, especially cell phones
- vi. Cell phones were used due to the haste in which the government went to virtual without appropriate equipment for virtual communications
- vii. Some agencies do not have laptops, cellphones, or other portal equipment for communications
- viii. For off the record conversations, some ombuds have used personal cell phone
- ix. Personal email is problematic and has risks due to FOIA and other applicable laws for disclosure when creating government records

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- x. Ombuds discussed that the Zoom platform could be considered the same as a telephone conversation if the transcript feature is not used or the meeting is not recorded
- xi. Personal cell phone calls may not be as problematic as personal text which could be considered as creating a government record
- xii. Some ombuds do not use personal equipment at all to separate work from personal completely
- xiii. Connecting personal devices to government networks could also be a big problem due to security issues
- xiv. For professional organization meetings like IOA some ombuds use personal devices to connect to those meetings
- xv. Some agencies use WebEx exclusively for external meetings and to use other platforms a request is made to IT to ensure security measures are in place
- xvi. One ombuds stated Zoom does not create a record and that it was specifically designed not to created one if not selected by the user
- xvii. Zoom for Gov is rolling out at several agencies
- xviii. The differences of Zoom and Zoom Gov would be an interesting discussion when roll out is complete
- xix. How are ombuds handling callers who incessantly call or call at off-duty hours on personal devices
- xx. Ombuds state they have blocked calls, screen calls, or have not had any specific difficulties
- xxi. One ombuds stated Zoom Gov is the same application as Zoom and acceptance to meetings does not appear to be different
- xxii. One ombuds stated they think use of personal devices for any government business opens the individual to a FOIA search
- xxiii. Another concern with use of a personal device is if your agency has stated not to use a platform like Zoom and you use it on your personal device then it appears you in conflict (doing something you been told not to do) with an agency directive
- xxiv. One difference noted was the use of personal computers with VPN
- xxv. VPN is entering the agency network and you have the protection of government controls
- xxvi. Using your personal device without the protection of government controls is the issue being discussed and not the use of VPN
- xxvii. The search for potential is also a concern as when a request is made a search is conducted for records and you may open yourself to search even without creating a record
